Louisville, Ky., Oct. 5.—(P)—Sena-tor Patrick E. McCarran of Nevada endorsed federalization of munitions plant in an address before the Veterans of Foreign Wars conventions here this morning.

CAMP HALSEY IS BEAUTIFIED

A deno will be given at the camp tomorrow night with music to be furnished by Frank Polenski's orchestra. Conway girls will be invited to the camp to dance with the enrollees.
