WOULD CUT OUT PROFITS OF WAR

Gov't Operation of Munitions Plants Urged

Louisville, Ky., Oct. 5.—(AP)—Senator Patrick E. McCarran of Nevada endorsed federalization of munitions plant in an address before the Veterans of Foreign Wars conventions here this morning. "Profit to industry," he added, "should be written out in time of war."

Senator McCarran said he felt government operation of the plants would tend to prevent war.

He also approved the V. F. W. uniform pension proposal which would establish standard rates to recipients of government funds because of war losses or services.

CAMP HALSEY IS BEAUTIFIED

Enrollees Do Much Work on Grounds

Enrollees at SES Camp Halsey, located near Centerville, 20 miles northeast of Conway, are spending the first few days in their new location beautifying the camp grounds, laying walks about the barracks, and obtaining their winter supply of wood, Capt. T. T. King, commander, reported today. The camp was moved last week from Camp Victor, north of Russellville in Pope county.

The grounds are being cleaned up, hospital and mess hall painted, windows and doors stained and walks laid of soapstone and shale, Captain King said.

The enrollees expect to have their supply of winter wood stored in camp before they begin their soil erosion labors, for which they were stationed in this area.

Camp Halsey is equipped with a sewage system, the only camp in the state having waterworks, Captain King said.

One of the showplaces of the camp is the recreational hall. A large fireplace has been built both outside and inside the building. A dance will be given at the camp tomorrow night with music to be furnished by Frank Polenski's orchestra. Conway girls will be invited to the camp to dance with the enrollees.

CARDINALS HOLD 4-TO-0 LEAD OVER DETROIT IN SIXTH

St. Louis Jumps on Tommy Bridges For Early Lead In Third Game

Sportsman's Park, St. Louis, Oct. 5.—The St. Louis Cardinals, back at their home field to resume the world series with the champion Detroit Tigers of the American League, held a 4-to-0 lead over the invaders as the teams entered the sixth inning of the third game here this afternoon.

Paul Dean had been charged for one hit in each of the first six innings and issued five bases on balls, but he was effective in the pitcher. He struck out Owen and Fox in Detroit's fifth with two men on base.

Tommy Bridges, No. 2 pitcher of the Detroit staff, was ineffective and in the fifth was removed in favor of Hogaett. Two hits in the sixth inning, one a triple by Ferris, which produced the first run in the inning. Dean drove in the second run in the next inning with a long fly. The Cardinals had obtained eight hits in the sixth inning.

The Log Cabin Democrat is unable to give a play-by-play account of the third world series game at St. Louis today because the change in time from Detroit to St. Louis makes it impossible to get the entire game before press time.

LETTERS REFUTE ALIBIS OFFERED BY HAUPTMANN

German's Dates and Places Disclosed to Be Untruths

New York, Oct. 5.—(AP)—Possession by Bronx authorities of 13 letters written in German, which Dr. Samuel Lubliner interpreter for the Bronx supreme court, declared refuted alibi dates and places given by Bruno Hauptmann, was disclosed today.

One of the letters, written by Fritz Hauptmann, brother of the prisoner and a tailor in Dresden, Germany, was addressed to Max Halleck, a Seventh avenue furrier, and asked whether the late Isador Fisch, who died in Germany last March, had any assets. The prisoner has maintained that Fisch gave him a package which three weeks before his arrest he discovered contained the money which authorities later found was part of the Lindbergh ransom payment.

The contents of the other letters was not disclosed.

Robbers Dig Through Wall; Bank Insolvent

Pangburn, Ark., Oct. 5.—(AP)—Were the faces of some robbers a crimson hue today when they found they had picked on an insolvent bank to rob?

One or more rubber-gloved robbers broke into the defunct Bank of Pangburn by digging a 18-inch hole in a brick wall and obtained between \$50 and \$100 in small change. The bank has been closed since 1930.

BABY CENSUS NEW PROJECT

Arkansas Births Will Be Checked

Little Rock, Oct. 5.—Arkansas has been divided into 10 districts each in charge of a field man, for the first "nose counting" of babies born in the state during the past 12 months.

The bureau of vital statistics of the state board of health, the federal bureau of the census and the Arkansas emergency relief administration are cooperating on the project, the purpose of which is to check the state vital statistics records and to insure that all babies born in Arkansas have been properly registered. The project is under the direction of Dr. W. B. Grayson, state health officer.
