

CAMP HALSEY ORDERED ABANDONED

Greenbrier, Centerville Lodge Protest Against Government Order

Citizens of Centerville and Greenbrier communities today protested an order directing Camp Halsey, near Greenbrier, be abandoned along with five other CCC camps in Arkansas. H. L. Groner, superintendent of schools at Centerville, and Dr. H. B. Hardy, former state senator, sent direct appeals to Congressman D. D. Terry and Senators Hattie W. Caraway and John E. Miller in Washington, seeking to keep the camp in operation.

Mr. Groner and Dr. Hardy went to Little Rock Saturday and conferred with Glenn E. Riddell, state coordinator for the soil conservation service and asked him to assist the Faulkner communities keep the camp. They suggested to Mr. Riddell that Camp Halsey be changed from a forestry camp to a SCS camp, and were told the matter would be taken up with J. W. Sargent of the regional SCS office in Fort Worth.

Little Rock, April 3.—The civilian conservation corps will operate 34 camps in Arkansas from April 1 to September 30, employing a maximum of 6,200 enrollees in conservation work, it was announced yesterday.

Plans call for opening three new camps, the re-establishment of two and the closing of six camps, giving the state one less than was operated during the winter.

The Little Rock CCC district will begin enrolling approximately 2,500 youths to replace enrollees being discharged this week at the expiration of their enrollment period in Arkansas.

Little Rock Truck Driver Fined, His License Revoked

Johnnie Robinson of Little Rock, driver of a W. A. Sanders truck which allegedly forced a Missouri Pacific bus from the highway near the junction of highways 64 and 65 last Wednesday, was fined \$50 on a reckless driving charge today in municipal court. Judge R. A. Bradley also ordered Robinson's driver's license revoked. No one was injured when the bus was driven into a ditch.

Robinson was said to have been the driver of a truck that caused a wreck among six or more automobiles parked in front of the postoffice here several weeks ago.

The man did not pay the fine and is confined in the county jail.

Students of Hendrix Predecessors Asked To Annual Reunion

Fort Smith, April 3.—Approximately 200 former students of Central Collegiate Institute and Hiram and Lydia College, predecessors of Altus, Ark., of Hendrix College, of Conway, have received invitations to attend the annual reunion at Fort Smith May 20 and 21, according to an announcement made at a meeting of the executive committee of the reunited students of the two schools Sunday afternoon at the Goldman hotel.

Harlan Hunt of Fort Smith, president of the organization, presided and the meeting was attended by all officers, Judge Charles Watts of Wagoner, Okla., delivered the main address.

Dr. O. E. Goddard, pastor of the Dodson Avenue Methodist church, program chairman, proposed that the first day of the convention, Saturday, be "infantry" day and the second day be given over to a memorial program.

The letters of invitation already sent will be followed by others, according to Mrs. W. A. Hill, secretary-treasurer.

The organization, the 75th name of which is the Reunited Students of Central Collegiate Institute and Hiram and Lydia College, was organized last year, when the first reunion was held here. That meeting was attended by more than 200 former pupils from as far away as the west coast.

Attendance Slumps At Oaklawn Track; State's 'Take' Off

Hot Springs, April 3.—(By Ed Farris, secretary of the state racing commission) reported Saturday night that semi-official figures compiled on the spring racing season showed the lightest "take" at the mutual windows in three years.

Farris said the semi-official check showed \$3,020,017 was wagered this year as compared to \$3,521,559 in 1938 and \$3,225,375 in 1937.

Paid attendance at Saturday's farewell program was 5,436. The last day's loss amounted to \$172,827 of which \$28,589 was wagered on the Arkansas derby.

The average total daily wager was \$102,059 and the average daily attendance was 3,625. The average bet, based on the paid attendance, was \$28.40 per person.

Big Personal Damage Suit Filed in Court

W. N. Logan of the Sattillo community filed suit for \$10,000 damages against L. S. ("Bill") Brockton in Faulkner county court today. Logan alleged in his complaint he suffered permanent injuries to his head and face October 18, 1937, when a truck with a rock allegedly thrown by Brockton on the highway near Sattillo, Logan claimed he suffered a complete fracture of the skull, resulting removal of 17 bones.
