Washington, June 18. (P) Sena-tor Long's "share the wealth" pro-gram was drowned under a chorus of noes" in the senate- Monday after the Louisianan - apparently seeking the foundation for a presidential bid had offered it as a substitute for the Roosevelt social security plan.

Point by point, Long sought to match his proposal against that of the administration. More than one of his colleagues asserted privately that the southerner was looking to-ward 1936 in so doing.
